I am a Human Geography undergraduate student at Cardiff University and I am currently carrying out research for my dissertation. Your participation is entirely voluntary, and if you do agree to take part, you may withdraw from the study at any time. This project has received ethics clearance through the University of Cardiff Research Ethics Committee.
