

**Topic (History and Geography) Home Learning****TOPIC 1**

Theme for the week: A new hospital has opened in London to help people with Coronavirus. It is named The Nightingale Hospital. Watch this clip to find out about Florence Nightingale, who the hospital is named after.

**Years 1&2 suggested activities**

- Talk to people in your house about Florence; what did she do to help others and why did she do this? What can you do to help other people?
- Draw a picture of Florence from the story and write a sentence to explain what is happening in your picture.

Years 3&4 suggested activities

- Create a fact file about Florence
- Draw a picture of Florence and add a thought bubble. In the bubble, write what Florence may have been thinking at that moment.

Years 5&6 suggested activities

- Suggest reasons why the hospital has been named after Florence; what was inspirational about her story?
- Draw a detailed portrait of Florence, choosing a specific point in the story. Focus on her facial expression to show how she felt at that time.

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TOPIC 2

Theme for the week: April 23rd is St. George's Day. Watch the clip below to discover the story of England's patron saint.

Years 1&2 suggested activities

- Talk to people in your house about George; why did he decide to be so brave? Can you think of a time when you have been brave?
- Draw a picture of George from the story.
- Make a sword and shield like George's or with your own design, ready to fight your own imaginary dragons!

Years 3&4 suggested activities

- Talk about the tricky decision the King made to send his only daughter. Do you think he had a choice?
- List the reasons for and against sending her and decide what you would have done.

Years 5&6 suggested activities

- The story is a legend. As such, it is up to each person to decide if they believe in it. Why do you think it was written; what does it represent?
- Do you agree with the villagers giving the dragon all of their food, animals and treasure? Why? What could they have done differently? What do you think this part of the legend teaches us?
